f you have been downtown over the past couple of months, you may have noticed a large boat moored in the Turning

and our overall downtown charm. I guess the word is getting out. Stop by, say 'hi', and show them a warm Petaluma welcome.

Brewster's Beer Garden

Speaking of the word getting out, I was concerned to hear the team behind this proposed new restaurant and beer garden was not from Petaluma. (Brewster's is slated for the parking lot across the Boulevard from "Cannonball Park" (officially named Penry Park.)

My concern turned to cautious optimism when I saw that local and esteemed "MAD Architects" is handling the project. MAD has redesigned and rehabbed some of our most significant Petaluma landmarks, restaurants and bars, such as the Water Street River Promenade and Jamison's

Roaring Donkey. (She also runs Petaluma's Thanksgiving Day Turkey Trot ... pun intended.) Although no guarantee of a project's ultimate success, the "MAD" stamp of approval shows that Brewster's is in good, local hands and it's that much more likely to fit into our community.

Outsiders have come into town before, with plenty of pomp and circumstance (and money.) They look to capitalize on Petaluma's recent culinary fame, only to find that the "big fish in a small pond" mentality won't float in these parts. Success requires listening to and getting involved in our community. Petalumans have strong opinions on what we will and will not support and are not simple backwoods hicks in need of cuisine guidance.

After meeting with Brewster's partner and chef Chris Beerman (great name, right?) and tasting some of his food, I am ready to drop the "cautious" part of my optimism.

Beerman grew up in the restaurant business, but more importantly, he is as genuine as they come. Brewster's is already working with local pig purveyor, DG Langley, to come up with the best breed of pig for their style of barbecue. That is about as culinarily Petaluma as it gets. (Stay tuned for my upcoming article on Brewster's Beer Garden.)
